### GIVE GOD THE CREDIT!

It is one thing to ask God to help you out of a tight spot. It is quite another to remember to thank Him for His help.

We should never forget to express our thanks when God gives His assistance when we have a problem—whether it be financial, spiritual, material or physical.

Once during World War II, when fighting was raging in Northern France, the minister of a small church in a coastal village noticed that a little boy kept coming in to pray each day at noon. He came day after day for two entire weeks. He would quietly enter the church, kneel before the altar, look toward heaven. Then, after a few moments on his knees, he would rise, stand for a few seconds looking at a large portrait of Jesus. He would then silently tiptoe out.

The minister could withhold his curiosity no longer. One day he interrupted the boy's prayers. "Son," he said kindly, "do you need help? Can I help you?"

"Sir, I've already been helped, thank you," the boy said turning a tear-stained face to the minister. "You see, I'm here to thank the One who helped me—that's Him there—Jesus. I didn't want

to forget to thank Him for answering my prayer."

"What was your prayer, Son?" asked the preacher.

"That Jesus would bring my daddy back to me safe and sound. And He did!"

The boy who took time to pray everyday to ask God to bring his daddy back did not forget, when his prayer was answered, to thank God for the blessing he received.

Are we as thoughtful? Do we forget to give God thanks for the things He does for us?

Here is a lesson for each of us. The way of answered prayer is a two-way street; when we bless God with our praise, our love and our thanksgiving, He blesses us with our hearts' desires. We must never take God for granted, but always thank Him for His many blessings.

People cannot be completely thankful without showing that thankfulness. Thankfulness is like age—it cannot be hidden. The boy showed that he appreciated the giver more than the gift. He expressed his thanks.

When we express our thanks to God for His goodness, we make certain that our thanks will not die from neglect. Being thankful is one important way in which we can repay the Lord.

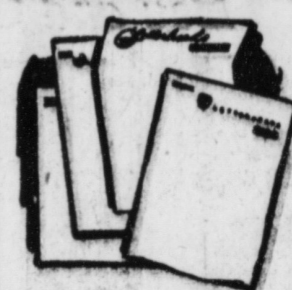
