Students Survey Use of Library

A survey completed recently by journalism students of Donegal high school revealed some interesting facts about reading habits of students and use of the library at the school.
The library includes a total of 4,931 books and there is an average circulation of 1,733 books throughout the school each month. 57.2% of these books are non-fiction and 42.8% are fiction.
Ten of the most popular novels, it was learned, are: "Treasure Island," by Robert Louis Stevenson; "Cecil Garth," by Gwen Briston; "A Tale of Two Cities," by Charles Dickens; "Silver Chalice," by Thomas Costain; "Gone With the Wind," by Margaret Mitchell; "All the King's Men," Robert Penn Warren; "To Kill a Mockingbird," by Harper Lee; "Love is Eternal," by Irving Stone; "Trustee from the Toolroom," by Nevil Shute; and "Jane Eyre," by Charlotte Bronte.
According to the survey, each student takes out an average of 2.69 books per month, and 24.28 books in a school year.

Raisin Bran Flake Cereal Sticks



Raisin Bran Flake Sticks are Muffins in a Fun Shape—

Muffins made with bran flakes or raisin bran flakes are a popular breakfast treat, and with reason. The texture is firm yet tender. When broken, they do not scatter crumbs. The color, flavor and eating quality all fulfill the requirements of a good 'breakfast' bread. When baked in corn stick pans as a change from regular muffin cups, bran muffins are a food that will please the family and make the breakfast table attractive. All breakfast cereals are excellent for ingredient use in recipes because they are inexpensive, convenient, and make nutritional contributions of protein, important B vitamins, essential minerals and food energy.

Bran Muffin Sticks

1 cup sifted flour 1 egg, beaten
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 cup milk
1/2 cup melted shortening
1/2 teaspoon salt 1 1/2 cups bran flakes or raisin bran flakes
1/2 cup sugar

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and 1/4 cup sugar. Combine egg, milk and slightly cooled shortening. Add to flour mixture, stir until dry ingredients are moistened. Fold in bran flakes, being careful not to overmix. Fill well-greased corn stick pans 3/4 full. Sprinkle top of each muffin stick with sugar. Bake in hot oven (400° F) until done, 10 to 12 minutes. Yield: 12 muffin sticks.

Letter to the Editor

A well-known builder and property owner of Mount Joy R1 was prosecuted and jailed by a Justice of the Peace of Pequea Twp. last evening for allowing a business sign to be posted on his property contrary to a Zoning Ordinance. I was owner of the land before the ordinance was passed. The business firm had my permission to erect the sign for one year in ignorance that there was an ordinance. I did not put up the sign nor see it and legally had no right to take it down. I asked a representative of the business firm to try to get a permit so I could fulfill my obligation. The zoning officers say this has not been done.
I was willing to pay the charge against protest if the Pequea Township supervisors or zoning officer would me a signed copy of the complaint. They were afraid to have any signed copy in my possession and said it was not necessary. neither was prosecution necessary. I feel that if the Pequea Twp. officials were too small to sign the complaint and back up the program they are promoting, I would submit to any prison cell they desire to put me.
I approve of the Planning Commission but I feel they are running ahead of themselves in these thinly-populated second-grade townships, and I oppose the fact that they take rights from those who own property by passing laws and forcing the public to accept their program.
I feel it is unfair to the taxpayer to have his taxes used to organize a Planning Commission to take rights away, and to use the taxpayer's money to prosecute the ones who have their rights stolen from them. That is tying the taxpayer's hands above his head and saying there's nothing to be done about it.

After enlisting in the U. S. Navy, he was stationed at the U. S. Naval Hospital at Philadelphia and at Bainbridge, Md.
