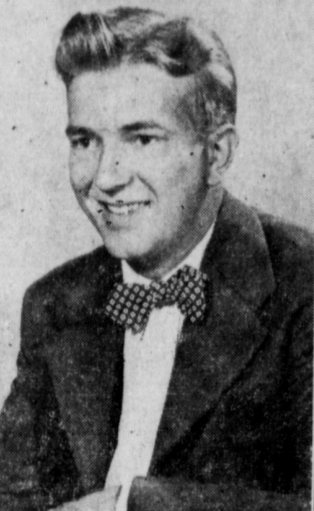




Dr. Kendig Is Winner Of Jaycee Service Award

Chamber Plans Clean-Up Paint-Up Week

Mount Joy is to have a "Clean-Up, Paint-Up, Fix-Up Week".

And, appropriately enough, this year, it is to be staged about the middle of May, just prior to the planned big, Memorial Day celebration.

O. K. Snyder, president of the Mount Joy Chamber of Commerce, said this week that "target date" for the project is May 19 to 25, which is the week before the celebration.

Because the community's big event is early in the summer, the possibilities and the benefits coincide with the usual time for doing "spring work" of painting, fixing, mending, and fixing-up.

A number of promotional plans are being investigated by the Chamber of Commerce to call attention to the campaign.

In the meantime, the Chamber is anxious that Mount Joy residents begin thinking as planting trees, flowers and shrubs on their properties; doing painting jobs; installing and planting window boxes; fixing up sidewalks and their properties in general and improving and cleaning store windows and fronts.

Mount Joy Farmers Coop Re-Elects Three Directors

Three men were re-elected to the board of directors of the Mount Joy Farmers Cooperative Assn. at a meeting held Friday night, Jan. 24, at Hostetters in Mount Joy.

They are Henry N. Hackman, Jay N. Newcomer, and J. Clayton Sangrey.

The association also heard a report from manager Simon A. Horton, who said that the 200-member cooperative marketed 43.7 million pounds of milk valued at \$2.4 million in the year ending Oct. 31, 1962.

Stockholders were told by president Abner Risser that an evaluation of surplus, price inequities, and diminishing fluid milk sales should be made to retain the market served by the co-op.

Parking meters in Mount Joy, apparently, are here to stay.

The question, then is "How to live with 'em?"

From Lebanon this week comes the story of how one community is not only living with 'em but is using them for a rather good promotion.

In that community there is an organization made up of merchants known as "Center Lebanon Association."

To combat the various problems of traffic, parking, meters, etc. the group has issued metal tokens which have a double service.

As it says on one side of the "coin" "Ride and Shop" the coins may be used in payment for bus fares. On the other side of the token are the words, "Park and Shop."

You see, the coin is the same size and made in such a way that it may be inserted in the parking meters instead of a nickel.

Thus, the token affords shoppers either bus fare to "center Lebanon" or parking meter payment.

In Lebanon the little metal discs—probably made of iron but copper color—originate with the merchants, who hand 'em out to their customers. They become good will builders, good advertisements and serve to help "pull" the people into center Lebanon.

The city and the bus company recovers its payments simply by taking the tokens to the bank, where they are redeemed from funds already placed there in payment by the participating merchants.

It's a neat trick and has a lot to offer for everyone concerned.
