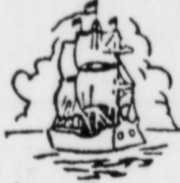

## Wise Way To Cook Vegetables



This year when the fresh vegetables begin to flood the market, try this nutritious new way to cook them. Clean and slice vegetables to make 3 cups, or use 1 pound. Wash, drain but do not dry. Measure 1 tablespoon Mazola corn oil into a saucepan or skillet. Add vegetables and desired seasoning such as salt, peppers, herbs. Cook over medium to low heat 8 to 12 minutes or until just tender. The time varies with the type and tenderness of the vegetable. Shake or move pan several times to prevent vegetables sticking to pan. For starchy or stalky vegetables, add up to 3 tablespoons water.

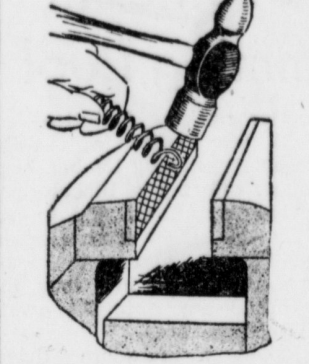

### New Hook in Spring

WHEN A NEW hook is needed on the end of a coil spring, the simplest method is to place the spring on the corner of a vise or anvil and use a hammer. This procedure is far easier than using a pliers, according to Popular Mechanics.



Place the last coil of the spring over the corner and hammer it at right angles to the axis of the spring. While hammering, move the spring slightly to avoid cutting the wire on the edge of the vise jaw.

## Improve Space In Wardrobes

Closets often are space-wasters because of inadequate planning.

To build up the storage capacity, remove the long clothes rod and substitute a short one in each wing. On the now accessible back, nail up some 3/4" furring at 16-in. intervals and top the strips with Masonite Peg-Board, gluing and bradding it so the wood strip fit between rows of holes to give maximum storage.

Metal fixtures for holding shelf brackets and other fixtures for supporting clothing and other items fit any of the holes.

Garments formerly cluttering up the center of the closet now hang at both sides, freeing the back for more extensive storage facilities.

The previously unused upper reaches of the closet can be similarly lined.

Also, don't neglect the inside of the closet door. Here can go brackets and fixtures to hold shoes, hats, neckties, and other items.
