"Tumbling" Act

A new, intriguing type per-
formance not seen locally by
the general public before,
was presented at the Don-
egal Annex Saturday evening
immediately following the
dedication of the new ambu-
lance.

Under the direction of
Warren Hayman, physical edu-
cation instructor of Donegal
high school, a group of a doz-
en or more D.H.S. boys and
girls presented what had
been billed as a "tumbling"
show.

Actually, the performance
was a two-part program of
tableaux and of hand balanc-
ing.

In the former, several boys
glided with a special non-in-
jurious paint formed a ser-
ies of statue tableaux depict-
ing sports and finally a special
performance for Memorial Day.

The hand balancing portion
featured nearly a half-dozen
boys and girls, performing to
recorded music in an almost-
ballet manner.

Sports Farm Dedication

Although the weatherman
did not cooperate more than
the minimum, the Mount Joy
Sportsmen's association dedi-
cated its Sports Farm Sun-
day afternoon, featuring a
demonstration by the Fens-
ibles from Lancaster.

The dedication program it-
self, was moved indoors.
Rev. Lester Koder opened
the program with invocation.
Alvin Koser acted as master
of ceremonies.

Elwood Martin, who has
been president of the organ-
ization for 18 years, dedi-
cated the property and he and
Koser burned the mortgage,
indicating that the Sports
Farm is debt free.

Two former presidents,
George Groff and Robert
Vanderslice, and two former
secretaries, Roscoe Hassinger
and Al Koser, were recog-
nized.

The principal talk was
made by Will Johns, editor
of the "Game News".
Lancaster County Game
Wardens Williams and Eich-
oltz also attended.

under the direction of Col.
Reaves F. Goehring Jr.

As one of their "stunts"
they fired their galling gun
with such precision that they
were able to literally cut a
huge timber into two pieces.

So well received was the
demonstration that plans are
being made to have the Fens-
ibles return, perhaps later
this summer.

Art Show

More than a score of local
artists displayed work last
week at the second annual
Memorial Day art exhibit,
which was held Thursday,
Friday and Saturday in the
Joy theatre building.

A year ago a similar dis-
play—although less extensive
—was part of the park dedi-
cation and was offered strict-
ly as a "wash line" show.

Under the chairmanship of
Mrs. James Roberts and Mrs.
James Phillips, the 1963
show was "bigger and bet-
ter."

Art forms included oils,
crayon, sketches, wood scul-
pture, ceramics, ink, but-
tons, water colors, etc.

Mesa Verde. These Indians
inhabited the southwestern
part of Colorado until 1300
A.D. Their primitive culture
was similar to that of the
ancient Egyptians and Baby-
lonians.

Zeller explained how the
Indians came from Asia to
America across the Bering
Strait.

Last summer Mr. Zeller
traveled through the area
where the Mesa Verde Indi-
ans once lived. He showed
the class pictures and bits of
pottery which he collected on
his trip.

Florin Man At Convention

Carl E. Heilman of Florin,
mathematics specialist in the
Department of Public In-
struction, is representing
Pennsylvania this week at a
national conference on "Math-
ematics in the Space Age."

The conference, sponsored
by the National Aeronautics
and Space Administration, is
being held at Marshall Space
Flight Center in Huntsville,
Ala., for State supervisors of
mathematics education from
throughout the nation.

Heilman will present a pa-
per on "The Role of the
Mathematics Supervisor,"
outlining the responsibilities
of mathematics specialists in
effecting an integration of
the study of mathematics
with that of science in order
to equip students with the
knowledge needed in the
study of space and space
flight.

Heilman, a native of Leb-
anon, headed the Department
of Mathematics at Elizabeth-
town College for 15 years
prior to joining the Depart-
ment four years ago.

Are Allowances Satisfactory?

Are your children satisfied
with the amount of allow-
ance they are receiving?

According to a survey taken
recently at Donegal High
School, 75 percent of the stu-
dents feel that they are given
sufficient funds.

Two-thirds of the ninth
grade boys receive allow-
ances, the study showed, and
almost all the girls in the
ninth grade receive funds
from their parents.

Are you wondering how
the average teen-ager spends
his allowance?

The survey disclosed that
the boys spend most of their
money on movies, dances,
bowling and clothes. Girls
like to spend their money on
movies, dances, clothes and
cosmetics.

It also was found that most
students work for their al-
lowance. They do housework,
farmwork, and babysit for
younger brothers and sisters.

Students were asked if
their allowances lasted them
a week. Half said that they
do. They were then asked if
their parents would give
them extra money during the
week. Almost nine out of ev-
ery ten students said their
parents would.

Some of the students stated
that they would like to
receive an allowance ranging
from \$1.50 to \$5.00.
