ABUNDANT LIFE

LIGHT OF THE WORLD

A friend of mine came to me the other day worried and depressed. "Oral," he said, "I'm frightened. The headlines of every newspaper I pick up are screaming of the turmoil and strife in the world today. The news broadcasts tell of the chaos and violence. It seems as if the whole world is covered in this darkness of sin and despair."

"Yes," I answered him, "the world is covered in darkness. But do not be frightened, for there is a light shining in the darkness. The light of the world is Jesus. There is no darkness that He cannot penetrate. He is the light that the darkness can never put out. In John 8:12 He tells us, 'I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life.'"

All around the world we see the darkness. The threat of war ... sorrow ... the racial prejudice ... heartaches ... the violent persecutions ... sickness and death ... darkness. But the light of Christ is still shining. The darkness has not, cannot, and will not put it out! Darkness has struggled for the hearts and minds of men since the beginning of time. His loving spirit will comfort you. He is concerned and cares about you. He will give you strength and calmness. Go to Him in prayer and be guided by the light of His constant love.

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FIX-UP TIPS
For Farm and Home

Use Screen Side

EITHER side of versatile Masonite hardboard may be used—the smooth face or the back, which has a mesh-like surface similar to canvas.

There are many applications in which exposing the screen side performs a non-skid function or furnishes a top-notch decor. For example:

Surfaces of lakeshore boat docks, floating rafts, diving boards and boat decks. To these apply the tempered Masonite hardboard with non-rusting screws through countersunk pre-drilled holes.

Treads of basement, attic or outbuilding stairways. With the exposed edges lightly beveled and the screen side exposed, the tempered board has considerable shoe-holding property, and it will even up worn treads. Fasten the hardboard with one-inch finishing nails. For additional safety, paint the steps a light color so they will show up well.

Interior walls. Here the reverse side of the hardboard gives the appearance of expensive canvas. A nice effect is gained by making a V-joint by means of a plane or beveling tool; otherwise cover the joints with narrow wood battens spaced eight or 16 inches apart. Primed and painted, such a wall furnishes a handsome accent area in any room.

Backgrounds. These might be a shadowbox, bookcase or tray bottom.

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
