Paul Belser of Elizabethtown, an executive of AMP at the home office in Harrisburg and formerly manager of the Mount Joy plant, was the speaker Tuesday noon at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Rotary club.

Prosecuted On Five Charges

A Mount Joy man was prosecuted on five counts of ignoring stop signs and one count of too fast for conditions by Lancaster city police Sunday, July 14 but officers said he was not driving his car when the violations occurred.

Officer Calvin Duncan said Cecil McCowin, Mount Joy, was the owner of a car, which he chased for some distance last Tuesday night, July 9.

Duncan said he came upon McCowin's car, loaded with teenagers, about midnight as he was going home from his shift. Because it was after the city curfew time, Duncan said he was going to check the ages of the occupants.

When he approached the vehicle, Duncan said the driver sped away and he gave chase. He said the car narrowly missed collisions with other cars. He took the license number and halted the chase to prevent an accident.
