carrier service will work out is not known and will not be known for perhaps 30 days, until there has been some experience by those in charge.

Eichler will begin his route at 444 West Main street with a family named Farmer and end at the intersection of Bruce avenue and Hill street where Howard Barnhard's box is to be located.

Along the way, probably at the Florin station and at a couple of other places, "relay" stations will be established, where small deposits of mail can be stored temporarily by a post office employee who will travel by auto. The carrier will pick up a quantity of mail from the relay points and continue with a load suitable for handling.

It is believed that there will be 430 possible deliveries on the route.

lines between the airport buildings, two high voltage PP&L wires and two telephone lines.

The wires slowed his speed and he plunged into the field, just south and across the road from the airport buildings.

A \$10,000 plane not more than a year old, the craft was badly damaged; only the electronic equipment and a few parts and assemblies were not damaged. The propeller was torn off the drive shaft and left several feet from where the plane came to rest.

Cameron climbed from the wreckage and was taken to Maytown to a physician who treated him for facial cuts, a broken nose and bruises. Later he was taken home by car by John Keener, who was waiting at the airport for the baby chicks. The peeps were not hurt, apparently.

Witnesses to the crash were George Endslo and his sister-in-law, Mrs. James Endslo, who were at their homes, west of the accident scene about a quarter of a mile. Also witness was Donald Yeagley, Lancaster, who was at the airport working on a plane.

A PP&L crew, which happened to be in the neighborhood on another job, had the electric wire damage repaired within 30 minutes.

Cameron's log book, which remained in the plane, showed that he had some 90 hours of flying experience.
