New Generators PP&L To Use

Combustion Engineering, Inc. has been selected to furnish two huge steam generators for the 1,800,000-kilowatt Keystone Generating Station, to be built in the western Pennsylvania coal fields, it has been announced by Chas. E. Oakes, chairman of the board of Pennsylvania Power & Light Company, P. P. & L. is one of three major eastern utility companies who will own the plant in Armstrong county, ten miles west of Indiana, Pa.

The local utility executive pointed out that the contract to Combustion Engineering, Inc. is the largest ever awarded for steam-generating equipment.

Each steam generator will be about as tall as a 20-story building — nearly 220 feet high — and almost half the area of a football field — 130 feet by 125 feet at the base. Each is designed to produce more steam than any other "single-furnace" generator ever built. At full load, almost 15,000 tons of coal will be burned daily in the furnaces to turn water into steam to drive the plant's turbine generators — the equivalent of about 50-ton coal car every 5 minutes 'round-the-clock.

This is the second major plant equipment contract awarded by the utilities in re-

cent weeks, the order for the plant's big turbine generators having been placed with Westinghouse Electric in July. Actual construction is expected to start at the site in 1964, with the plant's first unit to be in service in 1967 and the second in 1968. The huge Keystone plant will generate power virtually at mine-mouth and power will be transmitted as "coal-by-wire" to important markets in the East. The output of the plant is to be shared by Public Service Electric and Gas Company, Atlantic City Electric Company, Baltimore Gas & Electric Company, Delaware Power & Light Company, in addition to the owning companies.
