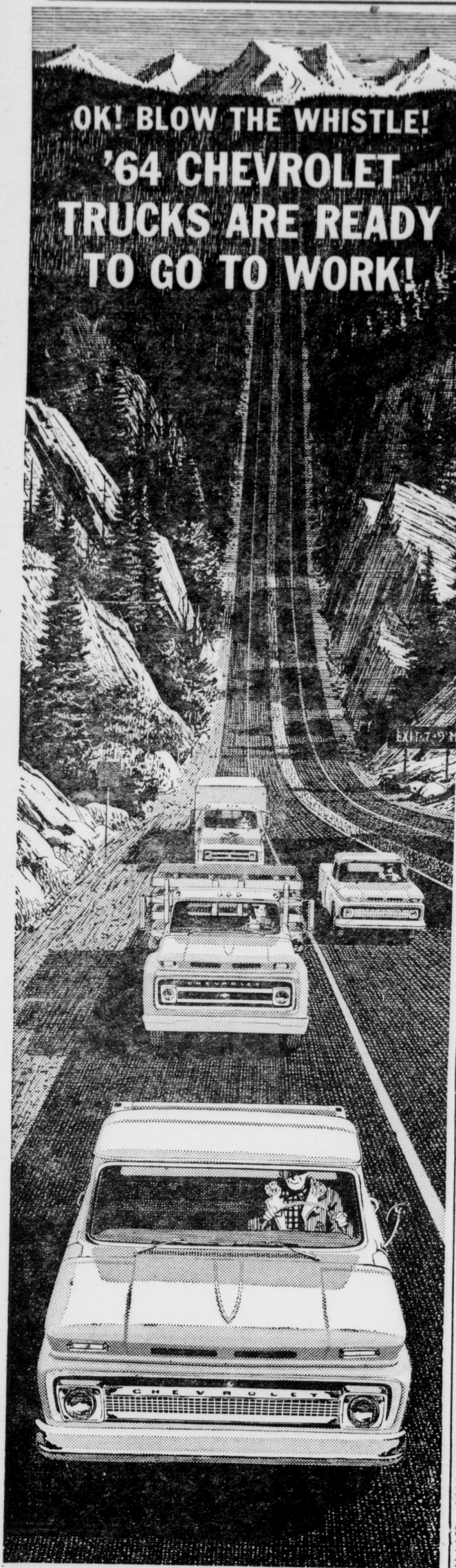


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- Notes From Florin -

Teaching in Africa

Word has been received from Priscilla Lane, formerly of Mount Joy, that she is situated at Nabumali High School outside of Mbale, Uganda, where she will teach mathematics and coach the girls' hockey team. Priscilla attended a six weeks training course at Columbia University in the Teachers for East Africa program. She then flew, with a group of eighty, to East Africa where individual assignments were made by the government of Uganda, Kenya and Tanganyika. T.E.A. is a program of the United States department of State's Agency for International development.

Nabumali is a coeducational secondary school patterned after the British school system. The staff of the school numbers fourteen, of which six are Africans, two Americans and six English. The town of Mbale is 160 miles northeast of Kampala, the chief city of Uganda. Priscilla writes that she is located 1 degree north of the equator in the foothills of 14,000-foot Mt. Elgon.

F.F.A. Officers In Training
