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**Mount Joy Borough Council Approves Curfew For Minors Under 18 Years Old**

Mount Joy is to have a curfew!

Persons under 18 years of age are to be off the streets and out of public places by 10 p.m. unless they can show valid reasons why not.

The curfew law was passed

by the Council Monday night as the Borough Council held its October meeting in the Friendship Fire company hall.

The ordinance passed unanimously on call vote. Mayor Frank Walter and

the police department had requested that the ordinance be passed.

The new regulation permits certain deviations but parents and operators of public places are made responsible for certain obligations imposed by the curfew.

In other business, Council joined with the Borough Authority to buy a used \$1,585 backhoe. The equipment is to be owned by the Council and rented to the Authority.

The matter of travel trailers, trucks, "junk" cars and unlicensed vehicles was discussed. There was no action. One specific complaint about a trailer was passed over. Council said it had no authority and ordinance. The matter was passed to the zoning committee.

Council agreed to meet in informal session with its solicitor, Harris Arnold, to discuss a proposed plan for his more frequent attendance at council meetings.

President George Groff turned over to the council secretary, Frank Walter, Jr., \$65 "rental" for use of the Cove this summer and gave an accounting of its use.

A petition asking that School Lane be extended eastward from south Delta street to Seiler school was ordered returned to the petitioners. The land involved is private property owned by S. Nissley Gingrich and is not under control of the Council, it was explained.

Exploratory talk was had concerning the integration of the Florin Fire company into Mount Joy borough. Council took a position of "go slow," "wait until after the first of the year," and "we will try to handle it by budget time."

**Ask Parking Meter Relief**

A proposal to remove or to "hood" Mount Joy's parking meters fell on a stony and thorn-choked field Monday night at the October meeting of Borough Council.

Two petitions—one signed by more than 30 businessmen merchants and professional people and one by more than 300 "citizens and shoppers" of Mount Joy—were presented by the Retail Merchants Division of the Chamber of Commerce.

Floyd Bowden, chairman of the division, presented the petitions, asking council to substitute a two-hour parking limit for the meters and said that merchants feel that the business climate in the borough can be improved if the meters are removed.

He was backed by attendance of about a dozen local merchants.

Councilman James Spangler volunteered to state the Council's position. He said, as he has on numerous occasions, that the meters are in Mount Joy to raise money to pay the borough's bills. He claimed that the meters "take

in" about \$8,000 per year. That amount, he said, is equal to a tax rate of about 3½ mills.

Council took no action but said that it would "consider" the matter. The consideration is anticipated at an "informal" council meeting to which the public is not invited.

At the non-public meeting, too, the Council plans to consider whether and when to have its solicitor attend its regular meetings.

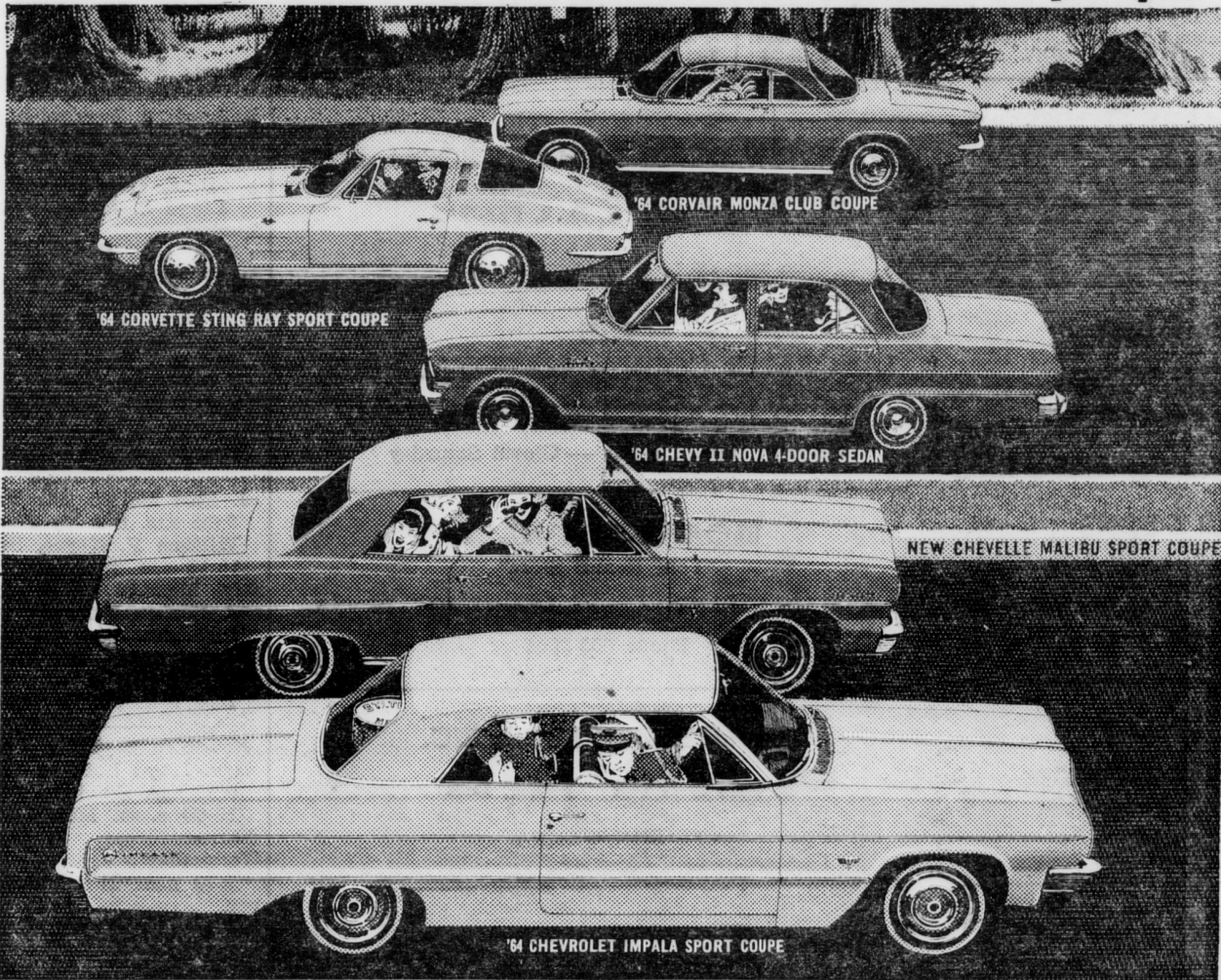

**Gary Ellis Gives Opening Talk**

Gary Ellis, Mount Joy RI, administrative officer for the Pennsylvania Bureau of Mental Hospital Services, gave the opening address for the annual meeting of directors of nursing and nursing education at all state mental hospitals and schools, held October 3 - 4 at the Excellent Inn, Harrisburg.

Pennsylvania has only 42 per cent of the quota of nurses in state mental hospitals that is recommended by the American Psychiatric association, according to Ellis, and there are only 925 psychiatric nurses in the 18 Pennsylvania mental hospitals. The recommended figure would be 2,212.

Progress has been made, Ellis said, but we should consider not so much "how far we have come, but how far we have yet to go."
