## MISS TEEN AGER



... answers questions about Junior Miss etiquette, grooming and interests.



**Q.** I overheard a couple of the girls talking after gym class and they said I'm a "poor sport." Frankly, the problem is that I'm good at sports and I always win. Do I have to try to lose to win friends?

**A.** You don't have to be a loser to be a good sport. By all means play the game as well as you can. But, if and when you win — don't crow. Just glow modestly. Your score for bragging would be zero.

**Q.** My grades are generally above average, but I have one subject — algebra — that's big trouble and a big bore. How can you study a subject you just plain don't like?

**A.** Chances are the reason you don't like algebra is that you don't understand it. Try talking your problem over with your teacher — or schedule a session with a classmate who rates "A's" in the subject. Once you've done this, try this three-point plan for attacking a problem subject: 1. Budget your time; 2. Shorten your study sessions; 3. Find a quiet atmosphere. Put yourself on a regular study schedule with short (but frequent!) study sessions. If you study in a quiet place, such as your room or the library, you'll find it easier to keep your attention on the books. Once your

algebra grade average begins to climb, we bet your interest will too.

**Q.** I've read articles which give the correct hair style for oval faces, heart-shaped, triangle, etc., etc. How can I tell for sure which shape I have? My mirror just doesn't give me a definite answer.

**A.** Agreed, when you've looked at the same face in the mirror for umpteen years, it's hard to be objective. But here's a tissue trick that may solve your problem. It takes two to do it — you and a friend. Cut single Kleenex tissues into ovals, circles, triangles, rectangles, squares and hearts. Cut them just a bit smaller than your face. Pin your hair back, and hold each cut tissue up against your face. Your friend can tell which of these shapes fits you. Incidentally, the face-shape test makes great fun at a party.

**Q.** What is the flower etiquette for a prom corsage? I'm never sure how to wear it.

**A.** Flowers are worn the way they grow — petals up. You can pin your corsage on either shoulder, but for dancing, flowers stay fresh longer when pinned to the right shoulder. If your dress is strapless, pin flowers at your waist (right side again) or to your purse.
