forced the tremendous industrialization of America by figuratively if not literally punching doorbells in the peace time years prior to the outbreak of war until General Motors, U. S. Steel, DuPonts and thousands of other great firms have had to mushroom to gigantic size.

Then, in time of war, these factories were readily available for the production of war ordnance, namely, guns, tanks, trucks, planes, etc.

So salesmen have tipped the scales for our victories in both World Wars, instead of our generals and admirals.

For German generals and Japanese admirals were just as brilliant tacticians as ours.

And the enemy's manpower equalled our own in numbers. Moreover, when an enemy would fly a plane against the side of our battleships, that was bravery in any man's language.

So it wasn't superior generals and admirals, or preponderance of manpower or greater courage, that won our wars.

No, indeed. It was our greater factory output. We equipped our men, plus much of England's and part of Russia's.

Remember, the Russians rode triumphantly in the Balkans (and Berlin) on American tanks and trucks.

Never let Communism forget that glaring fact.

American capitalism was what finally saved Russian Communism in its battle with Hitler.

thousands of gigantic factories, so all future historians should laud our salesmen more than our generals and admirals.

Many rotary mowers continue to beat off the grass blades instead of cut them off, because the blades are dull.

THE WINTER snows and cold weather have chased many field mice and rodents to the buildings; a good farmer should not tolerate the filth and destruction of any kind of mice or rats. Homeowners should be on the alert for field mice damage to shrubs and lawns. The cleaning away of junk and trash piles and the placing of poison under bait stations is recommended.

WE'D LIKE to suggest greater consideration of the many Correspondence Courses in Agriculture and Home Economics offered by Penn State University. These are very practical educational lessons given by mail at a very nominal cost. Many practices are changing from year to year and this kind of courses are a means of keeping up-to-date with a minimum of time and effort. Additional information is available.

SOIL AND WATER erosion

is still taking place on too many of our local farms. This becomes more important in recent years due to the very dry conditions. Slopes or hill-sides that are in one large field under cultivation will not be able to absorb the rainfall that does come; therefore, we get water running from the farm and taking valuable topsoil with it. In most cases this water and soil loss can be avoided. Alternate strips of sod and a cultivated crop will be of great help. When making plans for spring plowing we would suggest that farmers who have not had their fields contoured give this practice serious consideration. Both the Soil Conservation Service and our Extension Service will provide free assistance.

More than four million persons are injured each year in home accidents. And the kitchen seems to be the most dangerous in the house—for twenty per cent of all home accidents occur there. Many of these accidents are due to poor judgment, disorder, improper equipment, and incorrect use of equipment. And these accidents are most likely to happen when you're dog-tired. That's when your hands fumble, your feet trip over things, and your eyes fail to see possible dangers. So, when you're tired, take five minutes to relax. That's one way to help keep your name out of the accident statistic's column.

Lamb For Family Meals
Family meals need a change of pace now and then. And lamb may be just what you need for your family. You'll find lamb is flavorful in hearty main dishes. And as a bonus, it's easy to digest and adds important nutrients to your family meals. Although loin, rib chops, and leg of lamb are delicious, you can

make main dishes from the lesser known cuts. The lesser known cuts are usually lower in price, yet equal to high-priced cuts in food value and flavor. You may wish to try lamb stew, lamb curry or lamb patties wrapped in bacon. Of course, a little know-how comes in handy when you buy lamb regardless of the cut or the price. So here are some buying tips . . . look for lean that is pink to deep red in color and an outside covering of clear, white brittle fat. And be sure to check the bone—cut surfaces should be reddish in color and porous. No need to put off serving lamb—put it on your shopping list often for a change-of-pace meal.

Greens In Winter For Outdoor Planter Boxes

Planter boxes filled with flowers are used all summer long to give a cheerful accent to your home. The same accent can be continued thru the winter months. Why not put some greenery in these boxes. Evergreen boughs cut and inserted in the soil will look attractive most of the winter. Among the greens that are especially suited for this purpose are yew, pine, spruce, fir, arbovitae, and juniper. An accent of dried red ruscus from the florist will finish the effect.
