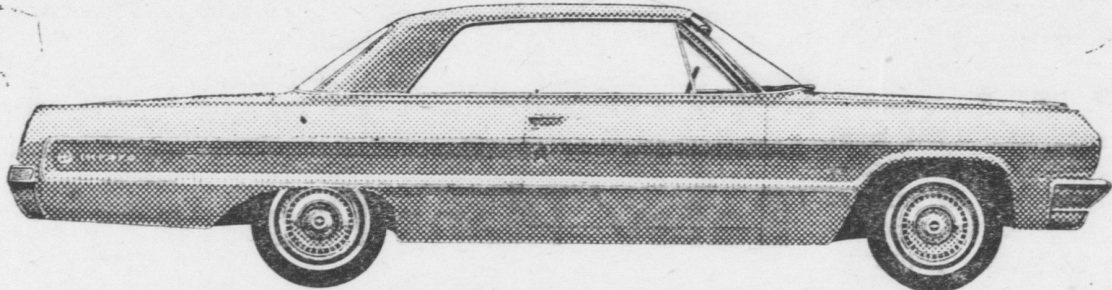
SAVE SEWING TIME

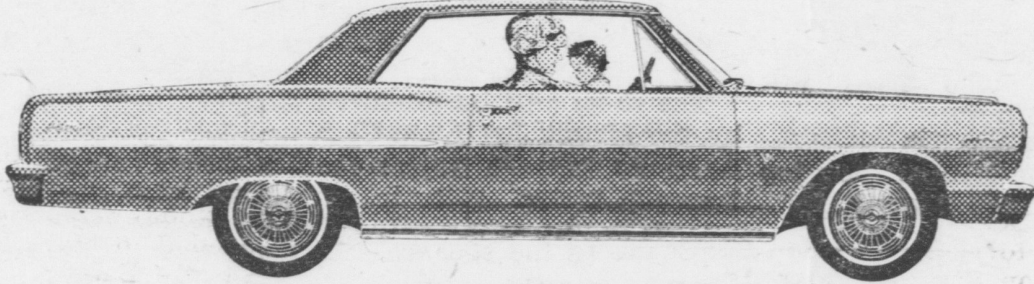
The Chimney Rocks near Hollidaysburg were used by Indians in the early days as a Council ground and observation post.

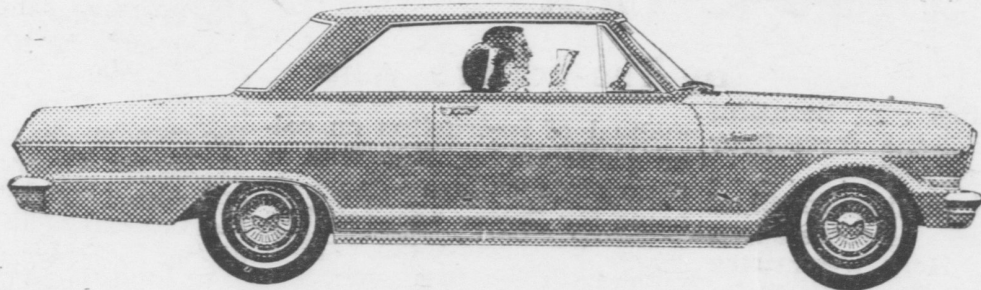

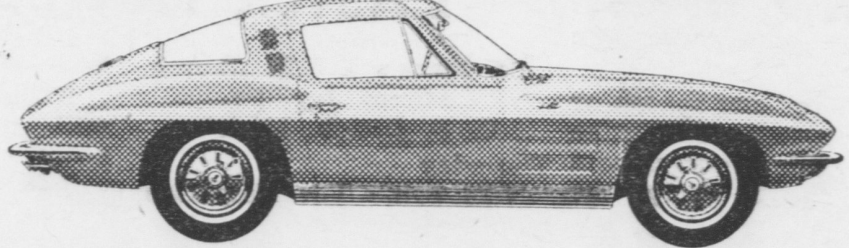
