Q. Last year a boy I date off and on walked into the house with a Christmas gift. I really didn't know what to say. I didn't expect it and naturally didn't have one for him. Should I have accepted it? Was I expected to return the gesture.

A. We hope you remembered to smile prettily and say thank you. Apparently the boy expected no more of you than that. This was his special way of telling you how much he had enjoyed your friendship over the year. Just continue to be a charming companion.

Q. Something always happens to me on a date. No matter how well I plan ahead, at some time during the evening, something disastrous happens.
