

The new members will be appointed by the present board in the same manner as if there had been a vacancy. Then, as regular elections follow, members will be elected according to a somewhat complicated "districting" arrangement, yet to be hammered out on the local basis. The rule calls for nine areas, each represented by a school director. These districts are to be formed in such a way that each area will have a population as nearly even to the others as possible, while following certain corporation boundries.


