Spring Brings New Problems

With the first rains and first warm hints of Spring at hand, it's time again for parents to remind their bike-riding boys and girls that traffic laws apply to them as well as to motorists, advises Edw. P. Curran, Safety Director of Keystone Auto Club.

"There are Bicycle Laws and a Bicycle Code governing use of bikes on public highways and thoroughfares, but too often they are disregarded or even unknown to many persons," he continued. "It's very important, therefore, that parents make certain that their sons and daughters realize that when riding their bikes in traffic they are just as responsible for their own safety and that of others as those driving automobiles and trucks.

"Bike riders are required to obey all traffic signals and signs, use proper hand signals for turns, ride on the right side of highways close to curb, park vehicles in safe places, stop and render assistance in case of accidents and report to police, assume liability for any damage resulting from careless and negligent operation of bike, stop while passengers are boarding and alighting from street cars, and keep bike in safe operating condition.

"Bike riders are forbidden by law to hitch on or hold fast to any other vehicle, carrying an extra passenger on the handlebars or other part of bike, engage in any trick riding on highways, and ride on sidewalks unless local ordinances direct otherwise.



Two Sewer Milestones

Sewers in the Florin area of Mount Joy are rapidly becoming a reality!

This week two rather important milestones were passed by the Mount Joy Construction company, which is laying the lines.

At midweek the important "high-pressure" lines from the pumping station on Donegal Springs road (midway between the Cross Roads church and Spookey Hill) to a point in front of the John Henry Lutz home on Donegal Springs road were completed.

The line is the vital connecting link between the pump station and the sewage

disposal plant. The cast iron pipes are being laid along the north side of the roadway.

The second important step is putting the sewer lines under the Pennsylvania railroad.

That work started this week at a point east of the Bachman Chocolate Manufacturing plant. The project principally involves pushing a large-diameter steel pipe through the ground under the railroad right of way.

Making that crossing under the tracks is one of the special engineering pieces of work involved in the actual pipe laying.
