Also, two permits for alterations and additions valued at \$6,900 were issued.

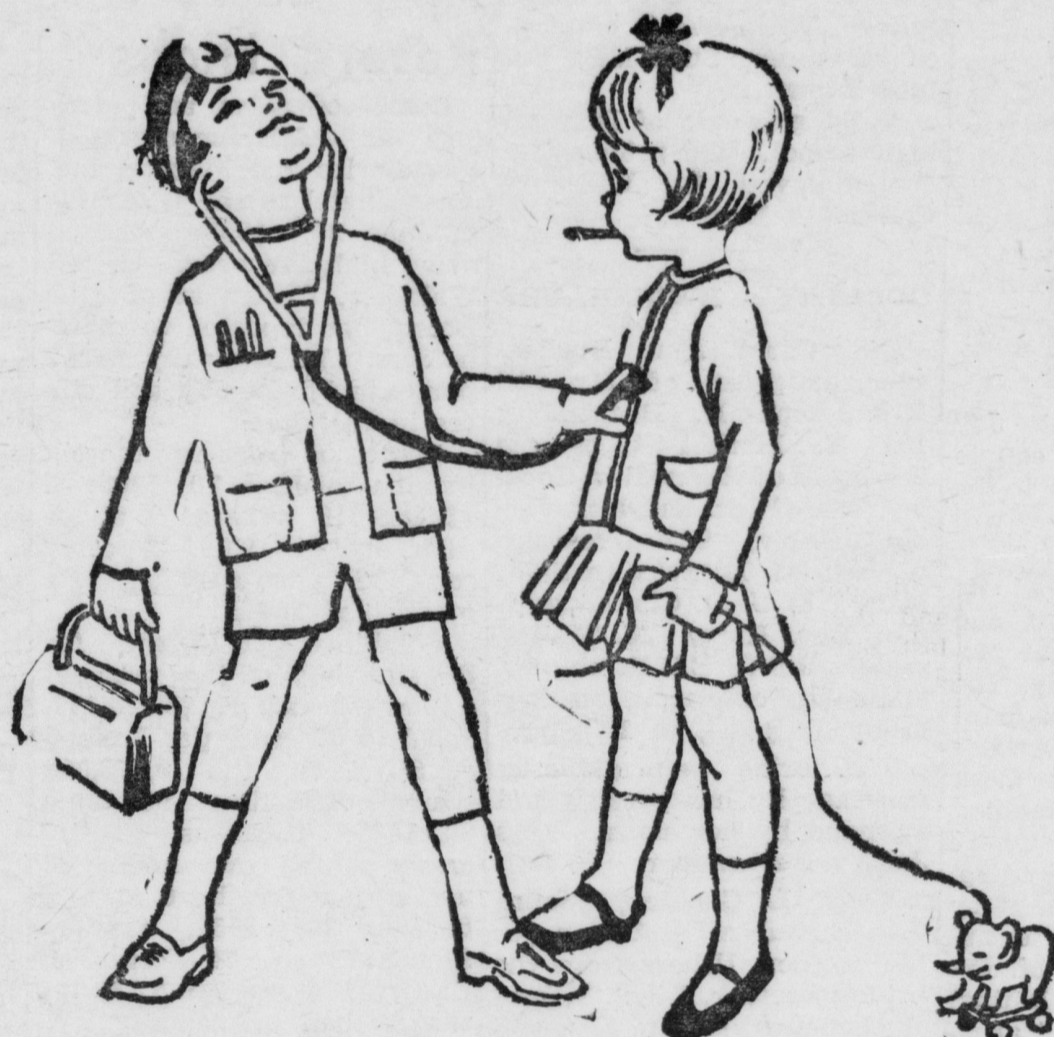
The Hempfield Jaycees Board of Directors met recently at the home of John Keener, Manheim R1.
