Marmalade Oat Flake Muffins

11/2 cups sifted flour 4 cup sugar 2½ teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt

3/4 cup milk 1/4 cup melted shortening 1 cup oat flakes
1/4 cup marmalade or

1 egg, beaten preserves Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Combine egg, milk, and shortening. Add to dry ingredients, blend just until dry particles are moistened. Fold in oat flakes. Fill greased muffin pans (2½ x 1¼-inch) ½ full. Spoon a teaspoonful of marmalade or preserves onto each and top with remaining batter, filling pans about $\frac{2}{3}$ full. Bake in hot oven (400°F) until lightly browned, 20 to 25 minutes. Yield: 12 muffins.
