To avoid undesirable odors and prevent contamination, keep your home freezer clean suggests Doris W. Thomas, home economist. Excess frost on freezer

walls or shelves reduces storage space and causes temperatures to rise several degrees. It also makes the freezer inconvenient to use.

Your freezer needs to be completely defrosted and cleaned at least once a year. The instruction book that came with the freezer will be your best guide. If you have misplaced the book, you may follow this procedure: Disconnect the freezer from the electric circuit, then remove all packages, and stack in boxes, then cover with blankets.

Work rapidly. As frost and ice melt, remove from freezer walls with a rubber scraper or smooth-edged wooden paddle. A sharp metal scraper may damage walls. Wipe up water with heavy towels.

Wash inside of freezer with a solution of two tablespoons of baking soda to a of the Columbia Presbyterian quart of warm water, then wipe with a cloth wrung in clear water. Allow to air and dry, then connect the freezer. Let it run 30 minutes before putting in frozen food. When returning packages, place oldest ones on top in a chest type freezer or at the front in a upright type.

Partial defrosting may be needed several times during the year. To do this, scrape from sides of freezer with a dull tool, such as a putty knife. Remove loose frost, then dry sides and bottom of the unit. You won't need to take out food packages; you can stack them, then rearrange as you clean off frost. During partial decurrent on.

Cream butter until soft. Add sugars, egg, and vanilla and beat until light and fluffy. Blend in flour, soda, and salt. Stir in chips and raisins. Drop from teaspoon, about 2 inches apart, onto ungreased baking sheets. Bake at 375° for 8 to 10 minutes, or until lightly browned. Makes about 4 dozen cookies.
