Easy to create, it suits parties large or small; its chilly richness is memorable as a coffee sweet or as the perfect finale to a feast. It is a favorite of all ages, too—pretty enough for adult parties, nutritious and pleasing to the young ones.

Heavenly Rice

2 cups cooked rice
1 cup pineapple preserves
1 cup miniature marshmallows
1 ripe banana, sliced
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Prepare rice according to package directions. Combine rice, preserves and marshmallows, and mix well. Sprinkle banana slices with lemon juice and add to rice mixture; cool. Fold in whipped cream and chill. Makes six servings.
