The first two were private schools for young ladies and young men, and the last of the three was a state school.

Mr. Harman in his letter reminisced about the medicine shows that used to come to Mount Joy: "I wonder how many remember the medicine shows that came to town selling Laymen's Soap and cure all tonics. Especially Warners Rattlesnake oil. These boys had a system. They sold 25c boxes of pills, about two dozen of them. Then they refunded your 25c plus 25c of their own. Then they proceeded to sell the oil at 3 bottles for \$1. The crowd thought they, too, would receive a refund plus an extra buck. So after nearly 100 sales, the boys ACCIDENTALLY dropped a snake in the crowd. It scattered, and the boys started their car and headed toward Lancaster."
