

Arrangements Made For Tetanus Clinic

The Tetanus Clinic will be set up at the Mount Joy Fire Hall, April 17 and May 15 to vaccinate anyone and everyone who appears for the immunization.

A physician and registered nurses will be in charge to administer the vaccine. Vaccinations will be given with single-use, disposable cartridges. Volunteer workers will provide wallet-sized immunization cards that will serve as a permanent record for each person.

Those in need of transportation will be taken to and from their homes by volunteer drivers in private automobiles. No one in Mount Joy who wants to obtain immunity against tetanus need miss out for lack of transportation.

Those needing transportation, should call T-day headquarters at the Mount Joy Fire Hall, Phone 653-9552, between the hours of 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on April 17. A committee member on duty will make arrangements and assign a volunteer driver.

The Clinic will be open from 11 a. m. until 5 p. m. and all persons who desire protection against tetanus will be vaccinated. A donation of fifty cents will be asked to defray the costs of material and supplies.

Tetanus is our most unnecessary deadly disease. Yet each year it kills hundreds of people, many of them small children, and makes additional hundreds severely ill.

This is unnecessary, because tetanus — or lockjaw, as it is often called — can be easily prevented by vaccination, in a program such as the Community Council has decided to conduct.

Mount Joy is the type of community in which tetanus is always a serious threat. The intermixing of agriculture and industry and the wide use of machinery of all types expose Mount Joy residents to minor cuts and abrasions as well as more serious accidents which open the way to tetanus infections. Tetanus organisms are most prevalent in the soil of agricultural areas and will be present almost everywhere in a community such as Mount Joy. More than half of all tetanus infections follow injuries so slight that the victim doesn't bother to have

them treated.

Tetanus won't cause an epidemic, but it is always there, ready to strike the unprotected. We know from experience in World War II and the Korean war that vaccination with tetanus toxoid gives complete protection to almost 100 per cent of those who are vaccinated.

The toxin produced by the germ that causes tetanus is one of the most deadly poisons known to man. Once the tetanus toxin is fixed inside the cells of the central nervous system, there is no

means available for preventing death. The death rate from tetanus averages more than 5 deaths out of every 100 infections and, before World War II — when many adults were vaccinated against tetanus — the infection killed as many as 90 per cent of its victims. Now, without periodic boosters, many of these adults have lost their immunity.

Antitoxin is available for use in suspected cases of tetanus. Bpt it is often used too late. Even when it is used early enough to offset the

tetanus poison, antitoxin is risky to use. Many people are highly sensitive to it and suffer severe and sometimes fatal reactions. Because of this, no doctor will use antitoxin without making adequate tests, tests which take time just when every second counts if the patient is to be saved from tetanus.

The Community Council hopes every person in Mount Joy — adults as well as children — will take advantage of this opportunity to avoid the deadly hazard of tetanus.

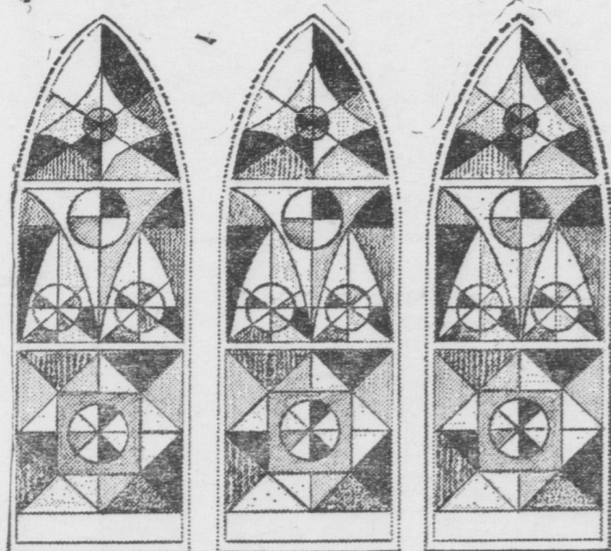
