SAMUEL CHILDS

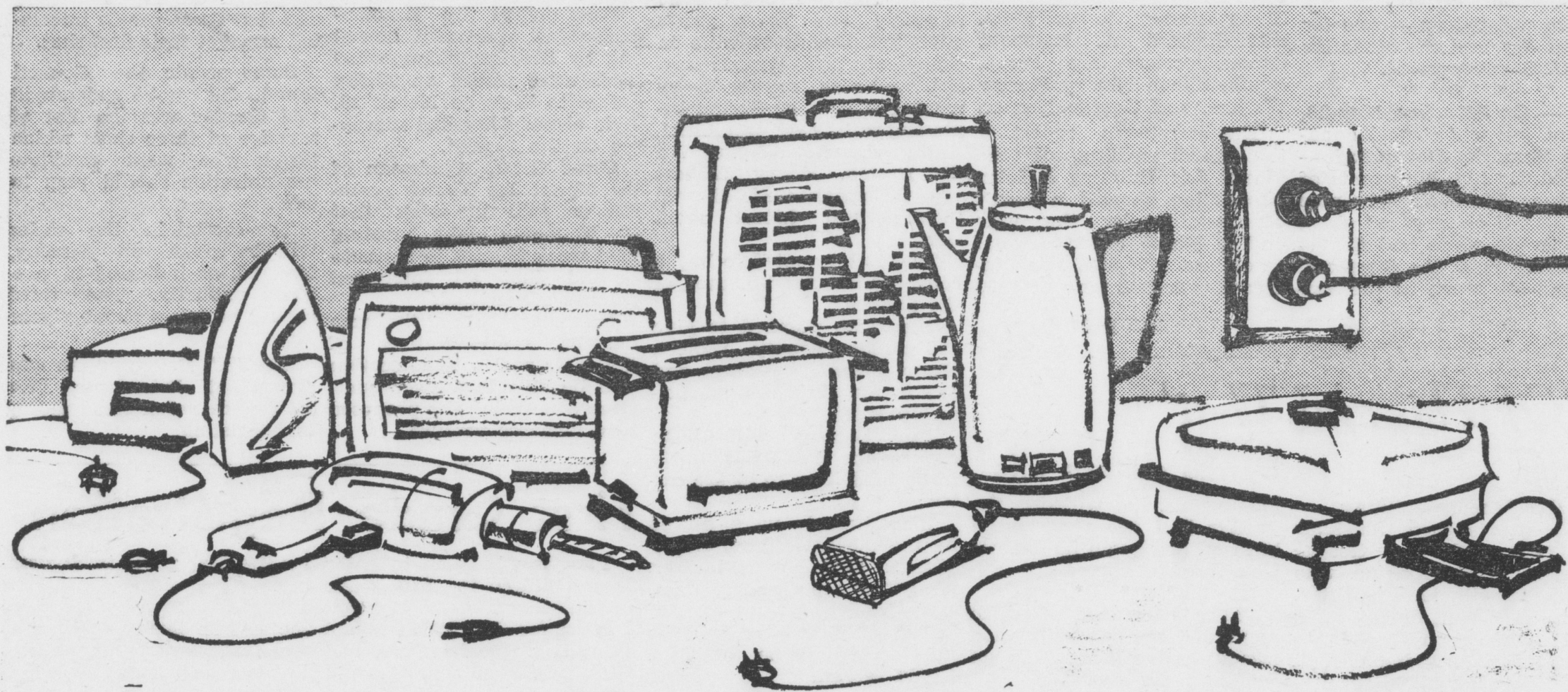
