## Preserves Big News In Cheesecake



Who ever heard of a cheeseless cheese cake? Well, we did! A glamourous and towering dessert that is light and creamy, it partners not a cheese, but tangy dairy sour cream with whipped cream, preserves and rich evaporated milk. This cake can be made hours ahead and needs no baking ... and it's a spectacular grand finale to your meal. So next time you want the perfect dessert, start with a trip to your shelf of jellies and preserves!

1 cup graham cracker crumbs

cup melted butter /4 cup sugar
/2 envelopes (2 tablespoons)

1 tablespoons vanilla
2 egg whites

teaspoon salt 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten

Cheeseless Pineapple Cheese Cake 1 6-ounce can (% cup) evaporated milk 3 cups dairy sour cream tablespoon lemon juice cup sugar

cup pineapple preserves 1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Combine crumbs and butter; press onto the bottom of a buttered 9-inch springform pan. Combine 1/4 cup sugar, gelatin and salt in a heavy sauce pan; add egg yolks and milk. Cook, stirring constantly, over low heat until gelatin dissolves and mixture thickens slightly. Remove from heat and cool to room temperature. Blend in sour cream, lemon juice and vanilla. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form; add ¼ cup sugar and beat until stiff peaks form. Fold into gelatin mixture; fold in preserves and whipped cream. Pour into pan and chill until firm, about 5 hours.
