Student Teacher In South Carolina

Miss Mary Anne Ressler, a senior education major at Bob Jones university, Greenville, S. C., is doing her student teaching this semester at the Alexander Elementary school in Greenville.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William K. Ressler of 739 Water Street, Mount Joy.

There are 58 education majors from the university doing their student teaching this semester. According to Dr. Walter G. Fremont, dean of Education, a total of 125 graduating seniors will meet certification requirements this year to teach. Their work is supervised by five university supervisors and the regular teachers of the classes in which they are serving their "apprenticeship."

Law Governs Young Workers

Although 1966 is the year of the tight labor market and of more jobs than employees, youngsters who are willing to jump into the labor pool find that they are under certain restrictions.

Some are very restrictive. But, all are imposed upon employers by the Department of Labor of the Commonwealth.

Minors under 14 years of age may not be permitted to work except on farms or in domestic service in private homes or some few other special areas. No minor under 18 shall be employed without an employment certificate, which is issued by school authorities.

Age 14 and 15 are restricted to not more than 4 hours on school days, 8 hours other days and 18 hours per week. Male minors may be employed at distributing or selling newspapers other than between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. but other occupants are barred. Even 14 year newsboys are limited to between 6 a.m. and

Although the Borough Authority had purchased the big Florin spring several months ago, necessary connecting lines and pumping equipment have not been available for furnishing water.

But, as summer has passed into fall and rains have come in some quantity and the expectation is that there will be more seasonal precipitation, the possible crisis has passed.

Thus, by good fortune a very serious problem has been avoided.

During vacations they are given a maximum of 8 hours per day and 44 per week.

When young employees are 16 and 17 during school term, they are permitted to work 28 hours per week and during vacation 44. Girls may not work between the hours of 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. and during school terms boys may not work between 11 p. m. and 6 a.m.

Some 55 occupations declared hazardous are prohibited. For instance, at ages 16 and 17, operating a motor vehicle or tractor on any highway as a paid employee is prohibited.

Under 18, employment is not permitted about, in or in connection with any establishment where alcoholic liquors are distilled, rectified, compounded, brewed, manufactured, bottled sold or dispensed. Also, ages 18 to 21 are prohibited from serving or handling alcoholic beverages where sold or dispensed.
