Three Clubs Hear Dr. Mays

Dr. Morley Mays, newly-installed president of Elizabethtown college, was the speaker Tuesday night, October 4, as Lions and Rotarians held their annual joint meeting at Hostetters.

Members of the Mount Joy Rotary and Lions clubs and the Florin Lions clubs attended with Jay Risser, Rotary president, in charge.

Dr. Mays talked of his recent trip into seven "Iron Curtain" countries, giving his observations and impressions of what he saw and experienced. The 21-day visit was something of an emotional transport, he said, pointing out that there was little of natural beauty.

He described "the wall," the barbed wire, the guards, the dogs and the lengthy, searching investigation as travelers pass from west to east through established check

points.

He was much impressed with the elaborate way the Soviet machine has set up protections to maintain its political, economic and social status. It intrigued him to relate the present situation to the wealth, power and influence of the czars, prior to '17

and the revolution of which he saw many many evidences still preserved.

He observed that freedom should not and possibly can be over protected. Freedom, he said should be able to stand the bright light of public inspection, discussion and even criticism.

He closed with a Jeffersonian idea, "Error of opinion may be tolerated where reason is left free to combat it."

Special music during the evening was provided by Mike McDowell, singing and playing his guitar.

Jay Barnhart, president of the Mount Joy Lions, spoke briefly and introduced members of his organization, and Donald Miller, president of the Florin Lions, did the same.

The speaker was introduced by Clair Gibble, Rotary vice-president and program chairman.

the public would be strongly urged to attend and to express opinions.

Such meeting is set for Monday night, Oct. 24, at 7:30 o'clock in Friendship fire hall.

The committee spokesman said that several suggested locations for the building were viewed, studied and considered. He mentioned the borough-owned land and house at the corner of North Barbara and Manheim streets a site on Lumber street owned by the Borough Authority, the old theatre building and others.

Possibility of building cooperatively with the Authority was discussed, he said but the need for such a building was not felt by the other municipal group.

As indicated on blueprints submitted by the committee, the proposed building, would face north Market avenue and would be of concrete block and brick construction.

Florin Fire company would have three bays on the south end of the building and the borough would have three on the north, plus those now occupied by the fire company.

No provisions were included for police.
