CROWN VETCH has come into popularity as a ground cover for slopes, banks and barren spots where it is difficult to grow grass. The highway department has been quick to recognize its value on steep areas where the soil is mighty poor. Crown vetch blossoms profusely in the summer months, grows about 20 inches tall, has no maintenance requirements and will not spread to adjoining areas. Here is a top-rooted legume plant worthy of consideration in those troublesome places where nothing else seems to

TOBACCO seedbeds will soon make their appearance on many county farms. The easily visible white muslin, neatly stretched over the tabacco beds, has been a kind of harbinger of spring for many of us. Tobacco seedlings emerge as very small, tender plants; they need protection from the cold, changeable days in late March and early April. It is truly amazing how the seedbed nurtures the tiny seedlings into sturdy transplants in the matter of a few


