## Call Rector For St. Luke's Church

The Venerable Donald  
Moore Whitesel, rector of  
Trinity Episcopal Church and  
chaplain at the Grier School  
for Girls, Tyrone, Pa., has ac-

cepted a call to become rector  
of St. Luke's Episcopal  
Church, filling the vacancy  
created by the resignation  
last December of the Rev. D.  
H. Feick.

Father Whitesel is a gradu-  
ate of Altoona high school,  
the Altoona Campus of Penn  
State university, Juniata Col-  
lege, and Philadelphia Divin-  
ity School. He is married to  
the former Sara Stever of  
Tyrone and they are the par-  
ents of three children: Don-  
ald, Jr., Andrew, and Julia.

During his ministry in Ty-  
rone, Father Whitesel was  
active in the community and  
area affairs. He served a  
term as President of the Ty-  
rone Ministerium and as the  
chaplain to Tyrone Elks  
Lodge No. 212. He is pres-  
ently a member of the board  
of directors of the Tyrone  
Community Chest, chaplain  
of the Citizens Fire Co., and  
vice-president-elect of the  
Washington School P.T.A. He  
is also a member of the  
board of directors of Blair  
County Mental Health Assoc.

In 1963 he was appointed  
by the Rt. Rev. John Thomas  
Heistand, Bishop of Harris-  
burg, as Archdeacon of the  
Altoona Archdeaconry. He  
has served the Diocese of  
Harrisburg in its youth work  
and is currently chairman of  
the Church Pension Fund, a  
member of the Finance Com-  
mittee, Board of Missions,  
Executive Council, and the  
Liturgical Commission, and  
was elected as an alternate  
delegate to the General Con-  
vention of the Protestant Ep-  
iscopal church to be held in  
Seattle, Washington in the  
Fall.

He was chairman of the  
Nominating Committee for  
the Diocesan convention of  
May 1966 and is a represen-  
tative of the Diocese of Har-  
risburg to the Pennsylvania  
Council of Churches.

Prior to his assignment in  
Tyrone, Father Whitesel was  
Vicar of St. Mark's church,  
Northumberland and All  
Saint's church, Selinsgrove,  
Pa. He was made a Deacon  
in St. Luke's church, Altoona  
on June 11, 1951, and ordain-  
ed to the Priesthood on Dec.  
21, 1951 in St. Mark's church,  
Northumberland by Bishop  
Heistand.

Father Whitesel leaves Ty-  
rone after serving there since  
July 15, 1955 and will take  
up residence in St. Luke's  
Rectory on June 15, 1967. He  
will hold his first service in  
St. Luke's on July 2, 1967.
