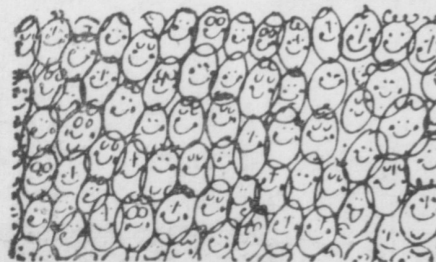

Chaplains Work With Viet Troops

More than 200 chaplains are ministering to our soldiers in Vietnam, the Catholic Digest notes. Another 2,000 are serving at army posts elsewhere in the world and throughout the U. S. All have been specially trained at the Chaplain School, at Fort Hamilton in Brooklyn, just beyond the Verrazano Bridge.

The student chaplains follow the practices of their particular faiths. But distinctive spirit of the school is interreligious, and it could not be otherwise in the multifaith army of a multifaith nation.

At the school, the principal courses of study are the "Basic" and the "Career." The basic course runs nine weeks, and includes a week of maneuvers in the field at nearby Fort Dix, N. J.

After considerable experience with troops, chaplains who wish to make a career in the army move ahead to the Career course, which lasts nine months. About 45 are now enrolled. It is entirely classroom work, and upon graduation the chaplains will be assigned to posts usually at Staff level, and some will ship out to Vietnam.

Make Inventory Of Home Items

If you had a fire in your home, would you be able to tell your insurance man just what items of contents were destroyed?

The American Insurance Association recommends that you make an inventory of your belongings.

To do this, the Association suggests you go through your house, making a list of each chair, table, and every other article of furniture. Opposite each, write the price you paid for it, or, if you cannot remember or do not know the price, put down a figure representing what you think its present value is.

This list can be made in duplicate. One copy should be placed with your fire insurance man so that he will have it for his reference if you have a fire.

You should also itemize small items you may have in drawers, such as jewelry & watches. Don't overlook valuable apparel and items on shelves in boxes.

AUTOMATIC WASHERS CAN POSE SAFETY HAZARDS

Doris W. Thomas Extension Economist says although automatic washers no longer pose a threat of accidental injury from a wringer, hazards are present. Automatic washers need to be grounded to eliminate the danger of electric shock. If laundry equipment is located in the basement, a greater hazard exists because the concrete surface is in contact with the earth. If you touch or grasp a part of a defective appliances while standing on the ground and touch a water faucet at the same time, your body serves as a conductor. But, if the machine is grounded, the current goes into the ground and not through you. If you feel even a slight shock or tingle when using a washer, take it out of service at once and have it repaired.

You can ground the washer through the outlet, or use a clamp on water pipes by connecting the clamp with a wire to a screw on the washer. If the outlet is to serve as a means of grounding, see that it has been grounded at the fuse box. If your house is not wired with grounding-type receptacles, have an electrician install at least three — one in the kitchen, one in the laundry area, and one in the basement or shop.

Your life, or that of a member of your family, may depend on prompt action. Since a defect in an appliance can occur quickly, keep the washer grounded to prevent any possible accident. Another safeguard is to keep hands out of a washer in action. If your machine is not equipped with an automatic stop when the lid is raised, turn off the washer before adjusting a load.

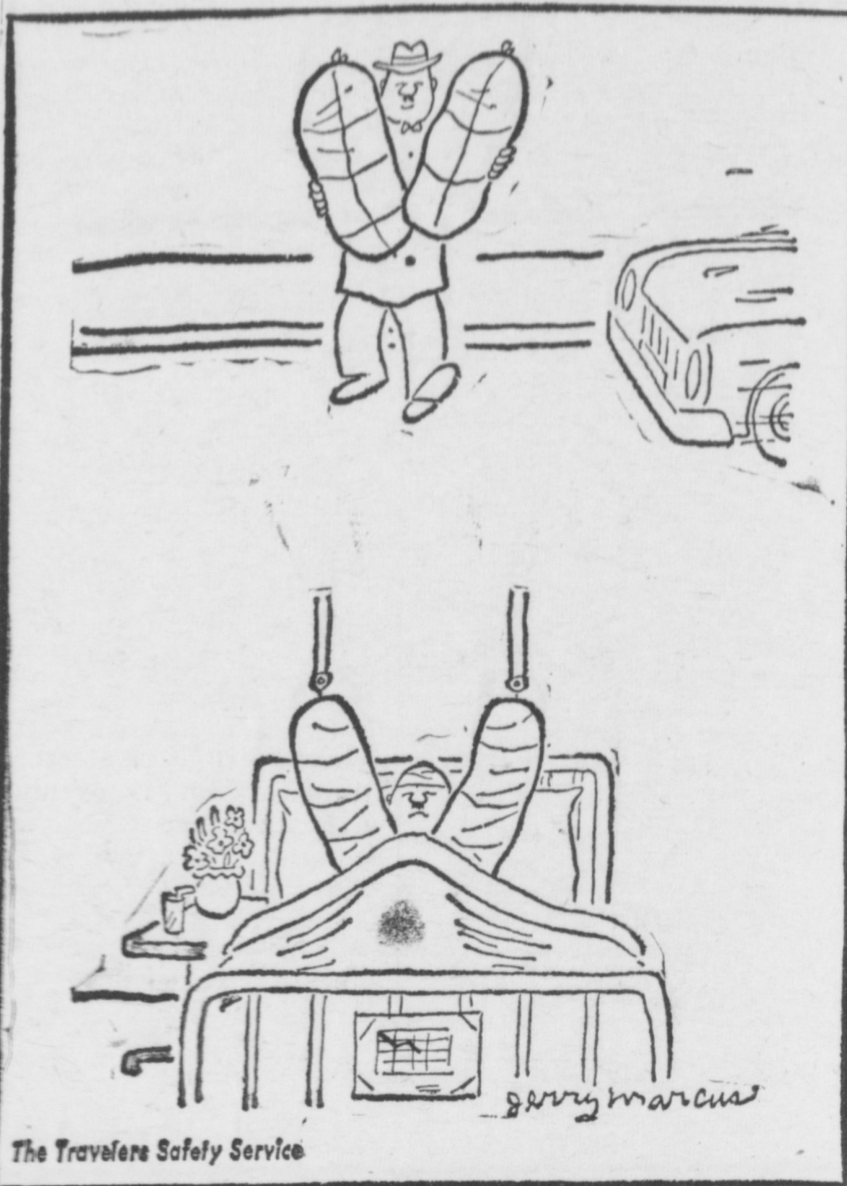
REPOTTING BEGONIAS

While repotting begonias, ferns and other house plants use a good soil mixture, says J. Robert Nuss, extension ornamental horticulturist at Penn State U. He also suggests removing all seed pods from annuals to prolong their blooming period.

Ready Children To Begin School

For preschool children and their parents, beginning school is of tremendous importance. Between now and September, parents will give considerable thought to getting children ready for school. Both short-term actions and long-term planning will be involved, says Mrs. Marguerite L. Duvall, extension specialist in child development of Penn State U.

Physically, the goal is a strong, healthy body. Long-range planning for this can include building good habits, such as eating and sleeping, and building muscles and eye-hand coordination thru active play. Among the immediate things are a physical checkup, clothes for school, and teaching children safety precautions.

Other areas are just as es-

sential as the physical one, reminds Mrs. Duvall. Children need to grow and develop mentally, socially, and emotionally to be ready for the milestone of beginning school.

Parents can help their children to meet this new challenge by enriching their experiences and stimulating their curiosity. They also can teach them how to meet new situations without fear and how to play with other children their own age. Helping children to be ready for school will make this new experience a pleasant one, Mrs. Duvall adds.
