Murphy Shoots for Billion

G. C. Murphy has set a goal of \$1 billion per year sales by 1978. This aim is revealed in December's "Chain Store Age", a trade publication, which has selected the Murphy Company as the subject for its December 1967 Great Retail Institutions study.

Murphy officials say this aim will be achieved through a stepped-up expansion program with an average of 25 new stores annually and the possibility of further acquisitions. Murphy presently operates 512 variety, department and discount stores in twenty-three states and the District of Columbia.

The McKeesport, Pa., based firm is giving priority to the growth in numbers of its A-A stores, a new concept in variety store retailing. Murphy opened the first of these "hard-hitting, fast moving, 'aster turnover' stores of tomorrow in 1966, has 13 now in operation, another 19 set for conversion and 5 new A-A units ready to open in '68.

In discussing the company's role in the retailing future Murphy Chairman and President J. S. Mack listed the following factors: "(1) In merchandise, specialized assortments, higher price lines, more trading up, accelerated competitive pricing, more private brands and realignment of merchandise groupings for shopping ease; (2) In store layouts, 80% to sales, 20% to services, wider more convenient customer aisles for directed traffic flow; (3) In research and development, continued customer research in both merchandise and service as well as computer analysis into all phases

of our operation; (4) In sales promotion, more advanced planning, more item promotion, greater advertising expenditures; (5) In customer services, more personal selling specialists for shoes, fashion goods, etc., more bank credit and (6) Regarding finances, we believe our cash flow, which is in excess of \$12 million annually with no funded debt, should be able to finance projected future expansions and still maintain an attractive dividend ratio."
