laudible purpose is at stake, for our system of law is not based on the idea that the means justify the end. We believe, rather, that our problems can be solved through reason, and that pattern of government must not be openly jeopardized.

Government, in the face of all emotional reactions, has a real obligation to separate the responsible and irresponsible elements of the civil rights cause. Such an obligation demands a pooling of reason, justice, law and order. No gains for the future will result from further encouragement of the advocates of rule by muscle.
