from various departments of the Commonwealth before a school can turn the first shovelful of dirt toward construction.

It's ironic that approval should come just now. For with the money situation in the school district being what it is, some good solid questions are being asked about this new elementary school building.

The district is in a financial pinch. Teachers' salaries are a pressing fiscal problem. The responsibilities of a new vo-tech school are beginning to develop. Building

repair costs are skyrocketing. All in all, it is not a pretty picture.

Where the new elementary school is concerned, it seems to be a matter of weighing the cost of a new building in 1968 against the costs of repairs to make the Marietta building suitable for use. Coupled with the repairs is the knowledge that new construction costs are certainly going to be greater every year the building program is delayed.

But, nevertheless the question is being asked on the eve of what is an almost certain increase in school taxes. The question, apparently, is not one of whether or not there will be an increase but rather of how much the increase will be.

Mount Joy has a new paved street this week. It is Terrace avenue in the Florin ward in the Bernhard subdivision. Several homes already have been built on the recently-opened street.

ion, both of Manheim, said that the runway will be black topped 40 feet wide and 2300 feet in length, which is practically the entire area of the present strip.

The new owners have received permission from the federal authorities to operate an air taxi service to all points in the U. S.

In charge as general manager will be Conrad 'Skeet' Nieman, who will offer charter service and flight instruction. Presently he is living in Pottstown but he will be moving to Manheim soon.

The company also plans to build a new 10-unit building with individual "T" shaped hangers. They will also offer minor repair service and an increased fuel service with both 80 and 100 Octane gasoline.
