A verdict of suicide was issued at the scene by East Hempfield Twp. deputy coroner Dr. Gerald Albright.

Haubert was a Gordonville native, a son of Harry Haubert, Martie Forge, and Mrs. Alma Rodgers, Lancaster, and the husband of the former Rebecca J. Lefever.

He had been employed in the maintenance department at Dodge Cork Co., since '61. Aside from his parents, brother and wife, he is survived by another brother, Charles, Columbia, and two sisters, Janet L., wife of Roger Andrich, Columbia R1, and Deborah A., Lancaster.
