Walls and Roof Progressing

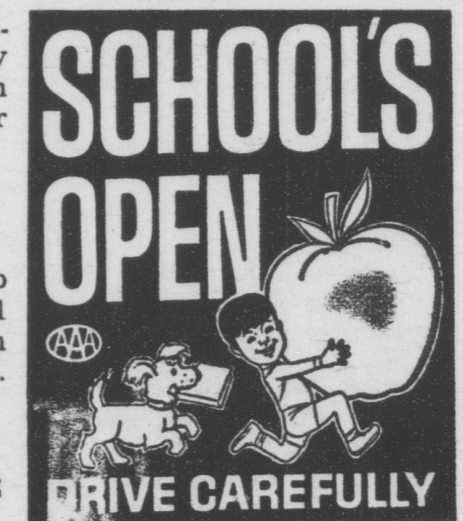
A new outside storage building on the grounds of Donegal high school is taking shape these days.
