The Sunday evening celebration takes place in the Glossbrenner United Methodist church. It will begin with a festive procession of the clergy, each in his traditional garb. Participating in the liturgy will be the host pastor, Rev. Clair Wagner, Jr., Rev. Donald Whitesel of St. Luke's Episcopal church, Rev. W. Lester Koder of Trinity Lutheran church, and Rev.
