

## **Control Your Lawn Weeds Now**



Have you ever been beaten to the punch by a weed? Most home owners would have to answer yes to that.

More and more home owners are finding that chemical weed control in the early spring produces a thick, vigorous and beautiful lawn during the summer. Chemical weed control in the spring eliminates weed competition for plant food and water, allowing the grass to get a better start.

For small and medium-sized lawns, the hose-end sprayer is an inexpensive but effective tool for overall treatment. For spot-spraying, the compressed air sprayer is ideal. If you have a large lawn, you may want to consider a power sprayer.

The Association states that lawn weed control is most effective when the chemical is sprayed in course droplets with the nozzle held 18 inches or less from the surface. Whatever sprayer best fits your needs, the important thing is that early weed control will give your lawn a good start this spring. And remember: National Lawn and Garden' Week, March 20 to 26.
