

SPRING clean-up time is here when many property owners will be improving the appearance of the place and burning some of the trash. (Providing regulations permit.) Along with this activity come fires that will get out of control and do damage to life and proparty; this should not happen if the person responsible is careful and remains at the scene until the fire is completely extinguished. On farms many fires are started too close to buildings and if there is a change in wind direction, some of the buildings are threatened. It takes only a tiny spark coming in contact with dry matter to start a blazing fire. Burn trash carefully at all times with plenty of supervision and assistance, if needed.
