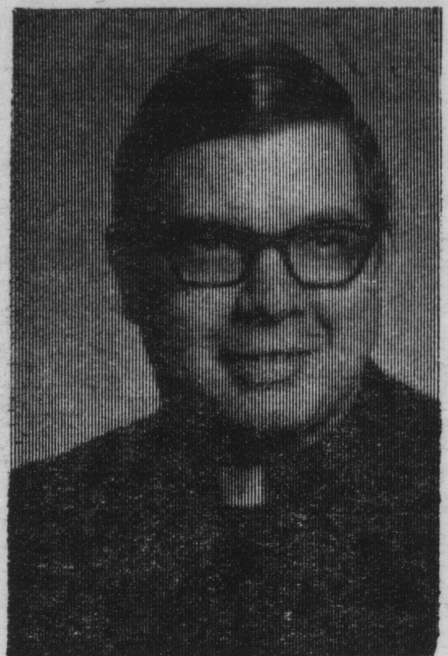
The annual East Donegal High School Alumni association banquet will be held on Saturday, June 6, at the Maytown Fre company.

In St. Louis they saw the "Gateway to the West" arch made of stainless steel; the Old Cathedral on the site of the first church built in St. Louis; the Jewel Box, a large conservatory filled with beautiful flowers located in Forest Park; and Busch Memorial Stadium, the home of the St. Louis Cardinals.

They visited Grant's Farm, a 281-acre wooded tract containing a cabin and land once farmed by U. S. Grant. This large estate is now owned by August Busch, Jr. and is operated by Anheuser-Busch, Inc. for the public. This is the home of the famous Clydesdale horses used in the Anheuser-Busch advertisements. A performing elephant act and bird act are shown here hourly. Buffalo, deer and other animals roam throughout this estate. Small trains take the people through the farm. A replica of a Bavarian village contains the refreshment stand, and stables housing the riding horses owned by the Busch family. In the museum are the many wagons and carriages owned by this family over the years, which are still used in parades & shows. Here are also all the hundreds of awards and ribbons won over the years by the Busch family. This is truly something to see!

The next stop was Abilene, Kansas, boyhood home of former President Eisenhower. Here is Eisenhower Center, covering 13 acres of landscaped grounds, encompassing the Eisenhower family home, museum, library and place of meditation.

The boyhood home is kept as it was at the time of his mother's death in 1946 and is quite an interesting place.

An award in baseball went to Tom Houseal and in soccer Steve Hess won the John Shoemaker Memorial trophy.

The Mount Joy Joyceette trophies went to Sue O'Connor and Bruce Sutter.

Arnold, who has been coach of soccer for many years and who is stepping down next year, was presented a gift from the team by Mike Rehbeard.

It was announced that track is to be made a varsity sport in Donegal high school next year.

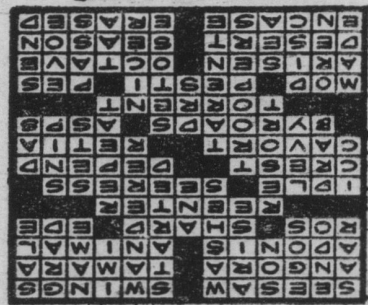
The first U.S. offensive operation of World War I was carried out by the 28th Infantry of the First Division on the western front in France on May 28, 1918.
