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

THE TOBACCO harvest is developing rapidly and many of the early plantings are ready for topping. The practice of using one of the chemicals to control suckers is geters that are planning to use es. this labor-saving practice are urged to keep several things in mind. In the first place the majority of the plants in the

bottom of stake tomato plants. This is very difficult to control and is usually not a sign of any harmful disease. In most cases it is a physical condition caused by changes in temperatures and soil moisture conditions. In order to keep this condition to a minimum I would suggest that the ground between the rows and plants be mulched in order to maintain a more regular supply of soil moisture. This can
