The men presented a panel discussion of "How the Jaycee Group sometimes procrastinates in its duties but somehow eventually gets the job finished.

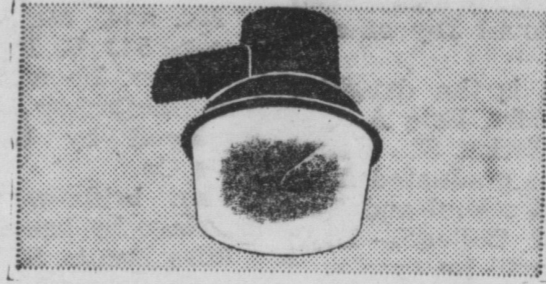
