street project will be completed this week.

Taking a viewpoint that the borough can not expect its citizens to keep their curbs in good repair unless the borough keeps its in similar condition, it was voted to repair some 30 or 40 feet of concrete curbs on S. Market street, adjacent to Memorial park.

Occupation Tax Collector Robert Kline said that the new levy has now brought in approximately \$23,000. He estimated that the total for 1970 (the first year) may reach \$25,000.
