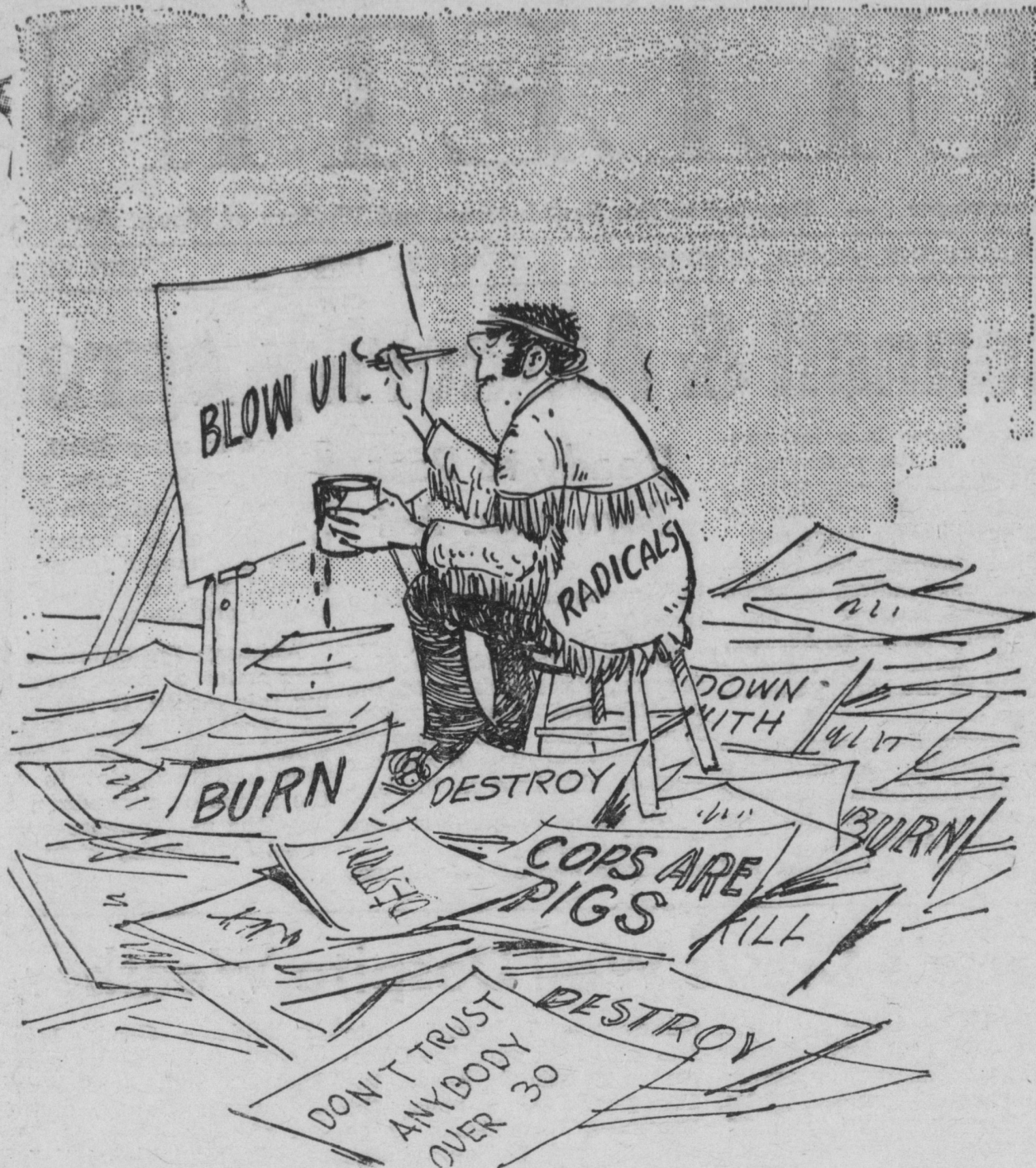

EDITORIALS ---

Despite a bit of recent minor unfavorable publicity concerning the Mount Joy Halloween situation, J. Bruce Kline, police chief, said this week that there was very very little trouble in the community during the past two weeks.

The youngsters, and the not-so-young youngsters, were on their good behavior, and at a time in the year which is most favored for vandalism, there was practically none.

In fact, the chief mentioned that he had seen very very little soaping of windows—one of the minor pranks of the season.

During the days immediately preceding Halloween, extra policemen were placed on duty (as is the case every year) and they supplemented

the regular force. Such an attack on the problem does, as the chief pointed out, "cost some money" but if at the same time the community is spared vicious and mutilating vandalism, then the money is well spent.

At times during the Halloween season, officers would work a combination walking-riding type patrol thru the town.

One officer in a police car would drop another man off in a neighborhood and drive away.

The man left on foot would then walk a few blocks, looking, watching, checking and, perhaps more to the point, being seen. In a few minutes the cruiser would circle back and and pick up his buddy. The action would be repeated in another section of town and then another and then another.

Mount Joy has had, this fall, some rather serious incidents of vandalism, but they were considerably in advance of Halloween—some even a month or more before the usual trouble time.

Keeping Halloween to a minimum deserves commendation to all concerned—the police, the parents, the youngsters of the community and to whatever influence it is in Mount Joy which combines to make this a good town in which to live.
