Melody Mumma, Lancaster county spelling champion, will participate the week of June 12 in the National Spelling Finals of America, to be held in Washington, D. C.





Increase of the real estate tax from 67 to 69 mills was accomplished despite the fact the new votech school system will cost Donegal district approximately \$80,000. All that amount must be raised by the local taxpayers.
