ed. He added that the matter has been placed in the hands of a committee for study. Selection of a project, he said, has been underscored with the purpose of maximizing the usefulness of the project and honoring Clarence Schock (although the name of Schock was not mentioned.

Board members heard two special reports. One was by Gene Newcomer, elementary guidance director, who has during the past 18 months developed a brand new program of student (and teacher) helps. He placed emphasis upon the need to find and to remedy problems of pupils as early as possible in their school career.

The second was by Lewis Brown, high school biology teacher, who under the encouragement of Donegal administrators, has been developing a new biology manual. He has observed, he pointed out, that most manuals are written by city men for city oriented schools. He has concentrated on compiling a pupil aid which is relevant to our local situation, "where," he said, "we have woods, fields, and trout streams."

Bids for shop supplies and medical supplies, totaling approximately \$6,500 were accepted.

Donegal failed to place Saturday in the state track and field meet, but hope continues to spring eternal and already notes are being made for next season.

Martin Heisey, who carried the Donegal colors to the big meet in both the high jump and the long jump failed to score in the points but he did emerge seventh in both events.

His performance was short of his bests for the season and his coach, Charles Portser, this week attributed it to "junioritis." And, that, in case it needs explaining it reaction to tremendous pressure.

Heisey, found himself, a junior in high school without experience in the "big time"

facing the very best competition in the entire state of Pennsylvania.

To say that such a situation is "tough" is a major understatement of the high school sports world.

One thing suggested as a possible problem for the young jumper was that the approach for both long and high jumps were made on artificial turf.

Heisey and Lancaster county athletes jump off cinders and good old Mother Earth.

Portser suggested that perhaps there was just enough added "spring" in the turf to throw off Heisey's timing.

Too, the lad who has thrilled track watchers this spring definitely is a hot weather performer. Saturday at Penn State was not hot weather.

Portser already has made a note to get Heisey outdoors early — March, probably — jumping without sweat clothes, tempering him for foul weather.

Thus, the lessons of the pits are being learned.

Held to only two hits, the Tribe tailed all the way.

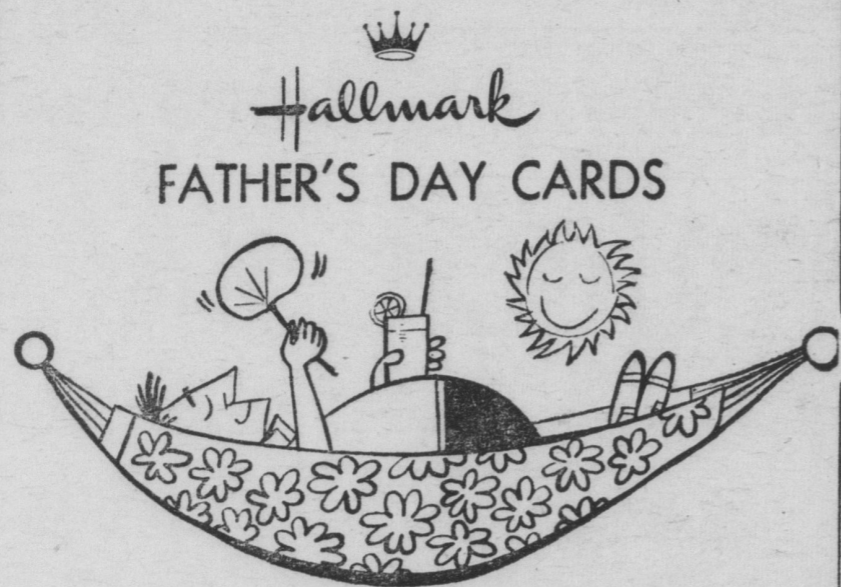
Manor chased a pair of runs across in the top of the first and added another in the final frame.
