This week the Lancaster County Planning Commission Graduatedfrom E'town listed 29 highway projects (in the order of their approved importance) which need attention in this area.

One improvement which deserves high priority which is NOT on the list is a big overhead sign above the approach to the intersection of Road 30 & 283 (near K Mart).

Literally dozens of travelers moving west fail to make this turn up the ramp and onto route 30.
