Who reads faster—men, women or young people? Observers believe that it depends entirely upon the individual.

Generally, the reader and his partner were left somewhat in private but much of the time there were other people in the building. While one person read aloud, the other listened, following silently.

About 10 a. m. Tuesday morning the readers ended the Old and began the New Testament.

Tuesday night at 10:30 o'clock Mike Young was reading in Ephesians.

At 3:10 Wednesday morning, Jere Herr, a Donegal high school senior, read the final words of Revelations, "May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all. Amen."
