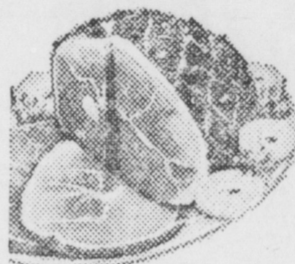

## Washington REPORT

One of my colleagues got himself quite a bit of publicity recently by getting thrown out of the Soviet Union. It so happens that I feel rather close to that incident because he serves with me on the Education and Labor Committee, and it was a committee trip he was on which took him into Russia. In fact, it was a trip that I was invited to take, and maybe I even should say strongly encouraged to take.

I turned down the chance to travel to Russia for several reasons. However, foremost among my concern was that I was not sure the purpose of the trip justified its cost. The purpose was to study education in the Soviet Union so that we could evaluate the strengths and weaknesses of their schooling system.

But how much can a handful of Congressmen learn in a few days of visiting? I doubt very much, because in Russia, particularly, they were certain to be shown only the best examples of what the Soviet system is doing. And that does not give the kind of perspective needed for meaningful evaluation.

In my opinion, if some good information about Soviet schools is really required, there are cheaper but much more effective ways of obtaining it. Some in-depth research by our committee staff from publications and documents readily available would almost certainly produce more useful data than that obtained by a trip behind the Iron Curtain.

However, my reservations regarding the trip are not really the point of this column. My point involves Congressman Scheuer's expulsion, and is this: If he had been doing in the Soviet Union what he was supposed to be doing, he never would have gotten thrown out. In other words, if he had been studying education, there would have been no problem.

But the New York Congressman had more political things on his mind than looking at schools. He was more concerned with other issues—in particular, the plight of the Soviet Jews—than he was in the committee's business. (I might note that I don't disagree with his interest in the Jewish problem in Russia, because I have co-sponsored legislation deploring the treatment of Soviet Jews. What I do question is his conduct on an official visit.)

It seems to me that those who decide to use taxpayers' funds to take official trips abroad have a special obligation to conduct themselves above reproach, but most of all to concentrate on the business that the taxpayers are paying for. It is not right to ask the American taxpayer to dig a little deeper into his pocket so that a Congressman can make some political points back home. I believe that the headlines Congressman Scheuer did a great disservice to the mission of the Education and Labor Committee, and certainly his eventual expulsion did no good for U. S. - Soviet relations.

This column is not a blanket indictment of all congressional travel. There are some very valuable and necessary trips made where the taxpayer gets his money's worth plus some. I think it is where the taxpayer gets his money's worth plus some. I think it is up to each Member of Congress to decide whether his travel at public expense meet the tests of need and importance. But too often I'm afraid that some Members make bad decisions, and their trips are personal and political junkets. Maybe its time for the public to make Congressman Scheuer and others account for that kind of travel.
