> The Senate ties the bill up debating the welfare provisions. Therefore, we came fore H.R. 1 received final consideration and then only because the welfare provisions were totally eliminated from the legislation.

Even without the welfare sections, H.R. 1 was a major bill because it expanded Social Security and Medicare benefits and increased payroll taxes to pay for them. Since there is sure to be wide genyouth from the Inter-church changes, I thought this column should be used to outline some of the major provisions in the legislation.

The bill permits earnings up to \$2100 per year without a loss in Social Security benefits The present earnings limit is \$1680. For earnings above \$2,-100, a reduction in benefits of \$1 for each \$2 of earnings is included which provides a greater work incentive than exists under present law.

There was a reduction in the waiting period for disability benefits. The present sixmonth eligibility period for receiving disability checks is reduced to five months effective January, 1973,

Disability benefit beneficiaries will be covered under medicare as of July 1, 1973. The bill provides for medicare coverage of a disability beneficiary after he has been entitled to benefits for not less than 24 consecutive months.
