Byers said that at least one of these containers arrives 48

out of every 52 weeks in the year.

Presently the building is being used as a warehouse.

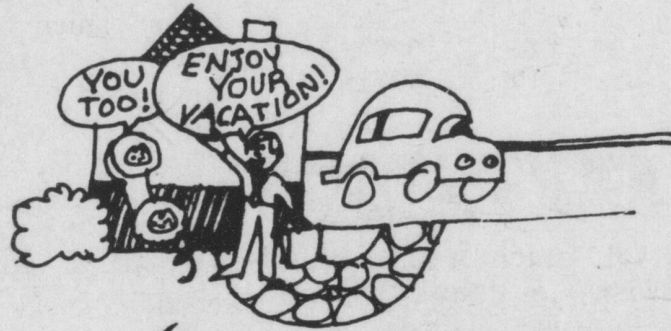
Floral Creations distributes over a very wide area, and maintains a permanent show room at 200 5th Avenue in New York, in

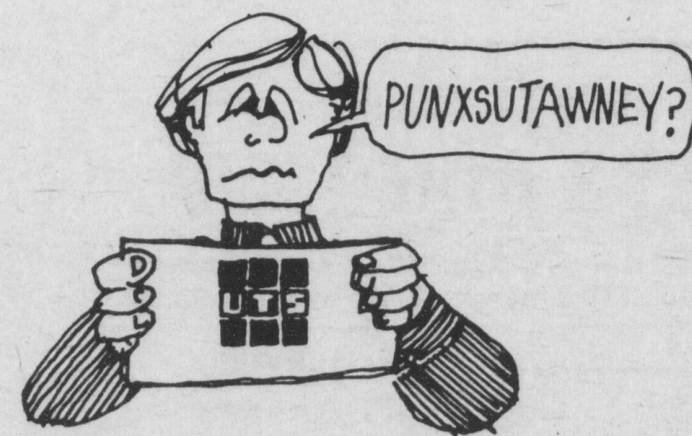
6. Are you going to be away from your home for an extended period of time? Based on how long you will be away, our business office representative can determine if you can save money by temporarily suspending your phone service.

7. Did you just get a wrong number when you dialed a long distance number? Don't hang up and grumble about it. Ask the answering party the area code and the number you reached in error. Then call the operator and tell her what happened. The operator will remove the charges.
